

I. The Context:

A. Job rebukes his friends because they fail to comfort him (Job 19:1-6; cf. 16:1) **B.** Job feels that everything is against him (Job 19:7-22) **C.** Job regards what he is about to say as so important that he wishes it recorded in a permanent manner (Job 19:23-24)

II. In His grief, Job turns (in hope) to God as his Vindicator: (Job 19:25-27)

A. "I Know that My Redeemer Lives"

- The Hebrew word, Go'el means
 "Redeemer"
 "Kinsman Redeemer"
- "Vindicator"

2. The Go'el Institution Involves a Package of laws:

a. Levirate Marriage

(Deut. 25:5f.; Ruth 4:5, 10; Matt. 22:24)

b. The Redemption of Property

(Lev. 25:23-28).

The Go'el has the responsibility to buy

back the property.

<u>c. The Redemption of Persons – the</u> <u>Go'el is Responsible to buy the Person</u> <u>back</u> (Lev. 25:25)

<u>d. The Redemption of Blood</u> (Num. 35; Deut. 19:1-13)

<u>e. Restitution (Repayment of the Go'el)</u> (Num. 5:8)

B. "He will take His stand on the earth."

C. "I shall see God." I Corinthians 13:12 I John 3:1-3 Revelation 22:4

II. Job's Go'al is the Lord Jesus Christ. John 1:14; 12:45; 14:7-11; Col. 1:15; Heb. 1:3; 2:17-18
